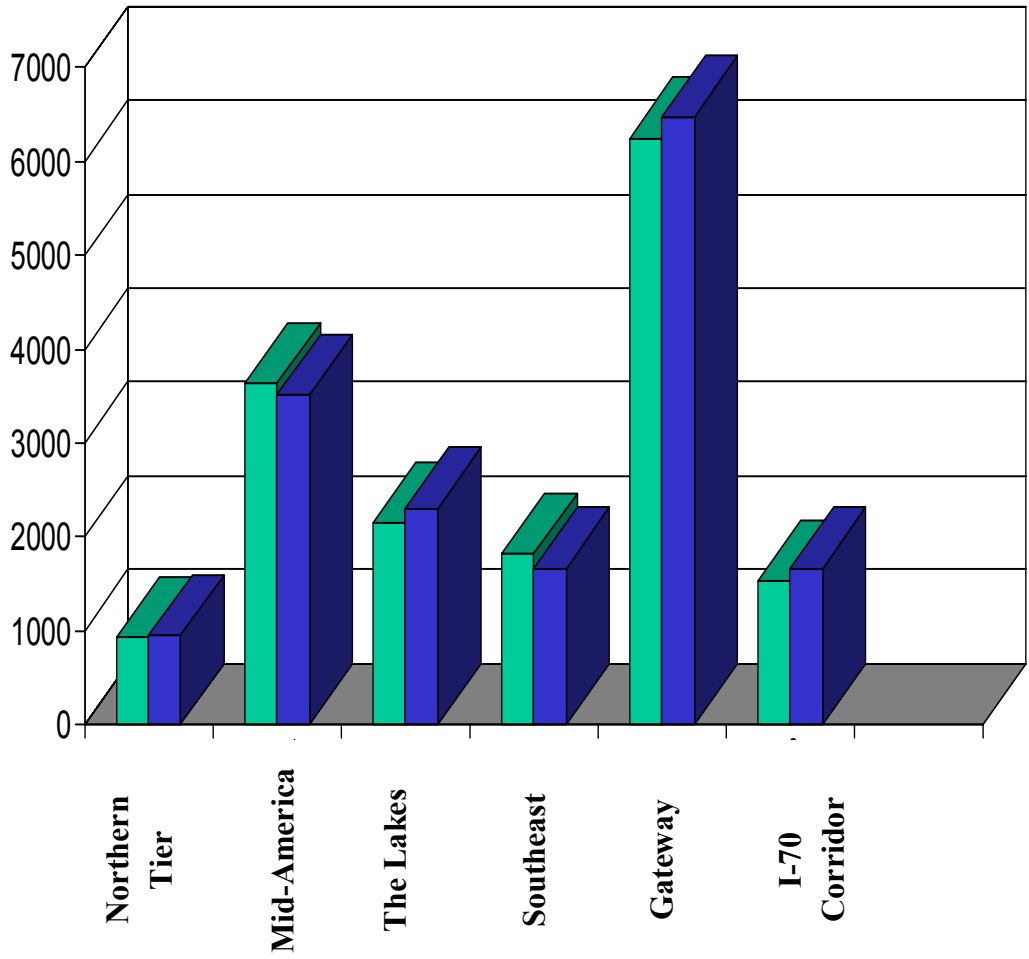

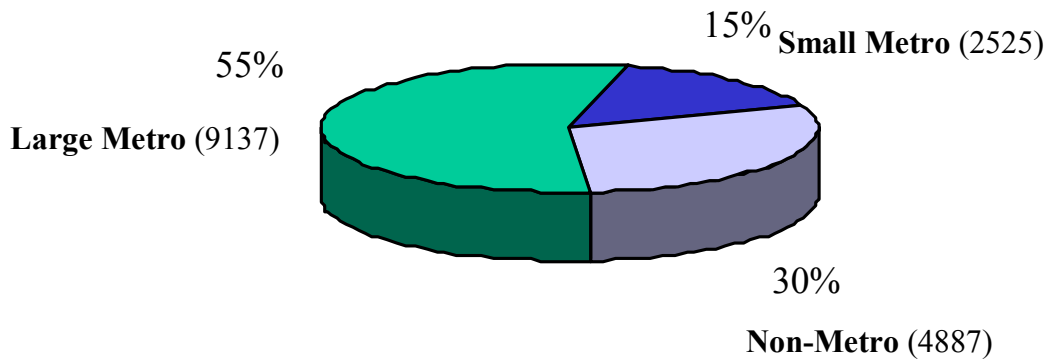

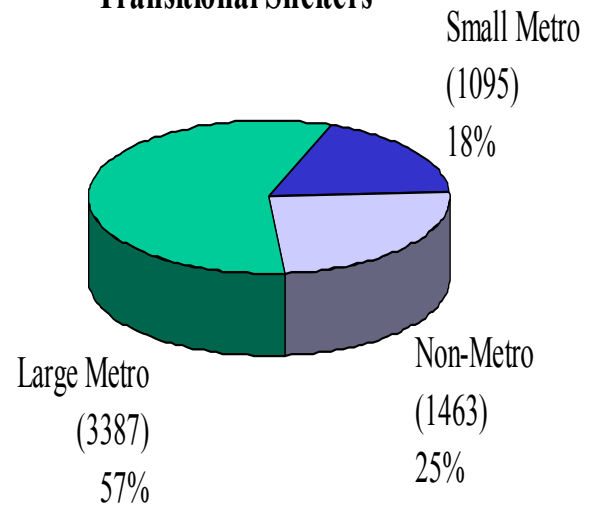

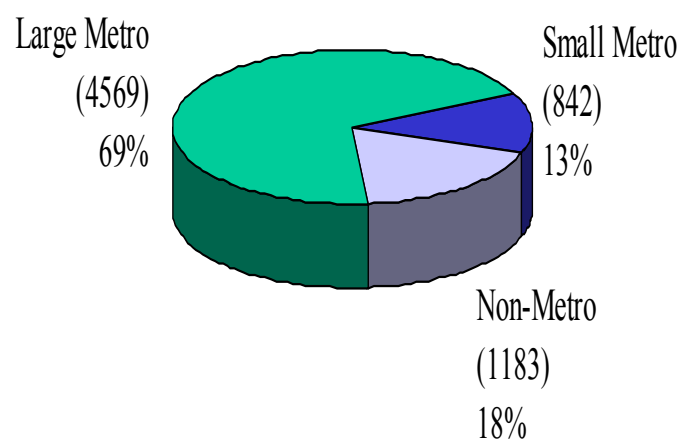

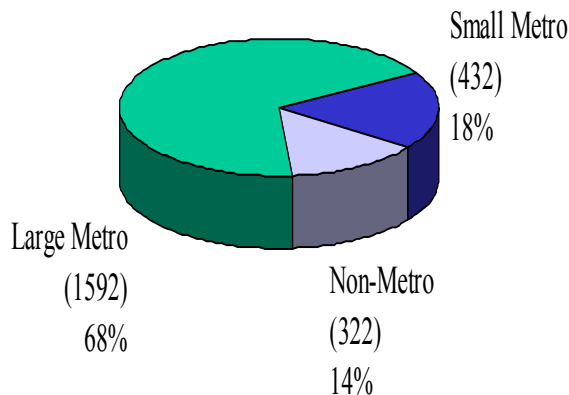

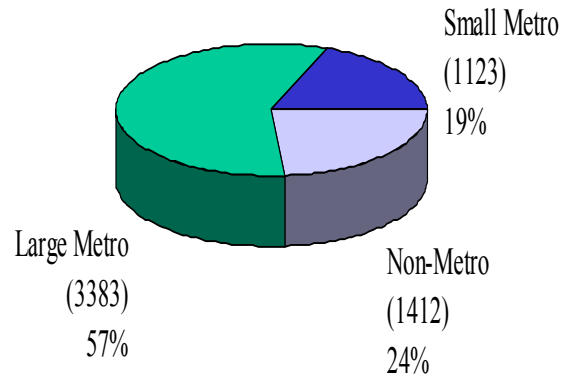

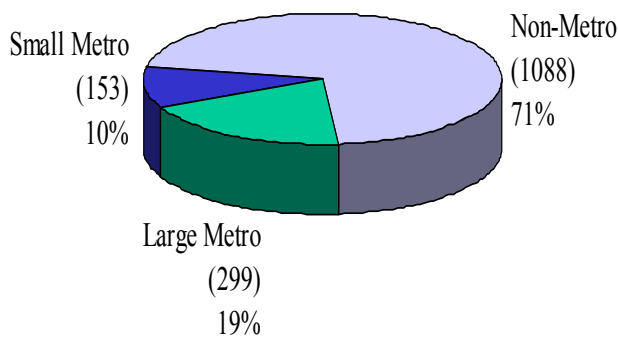

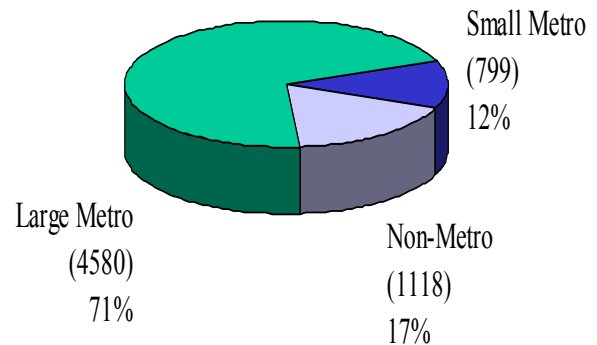

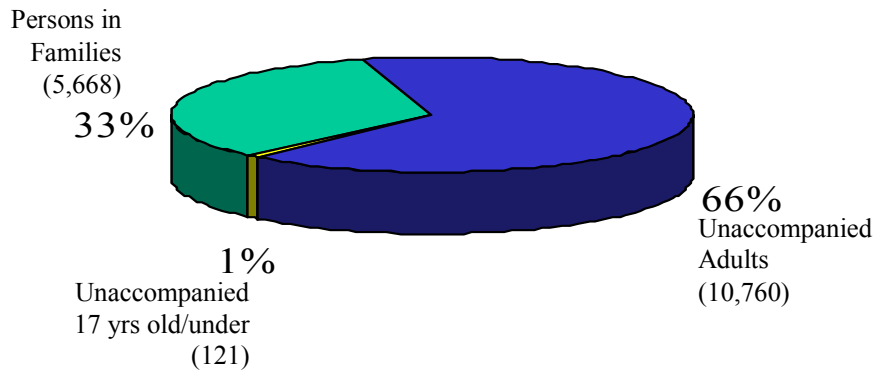

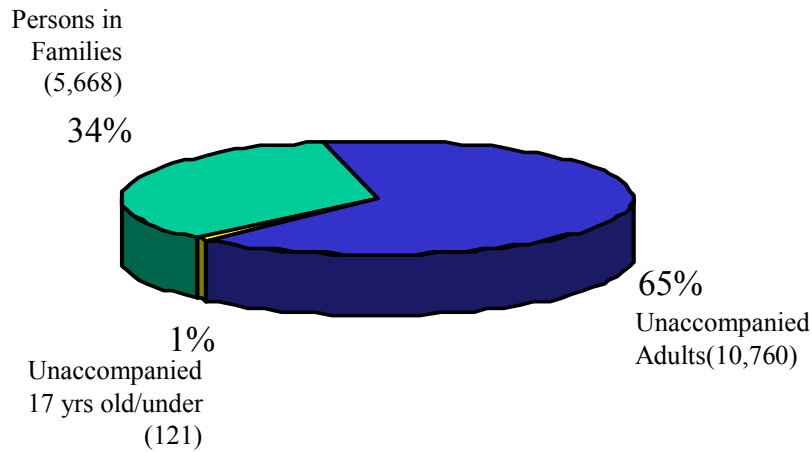

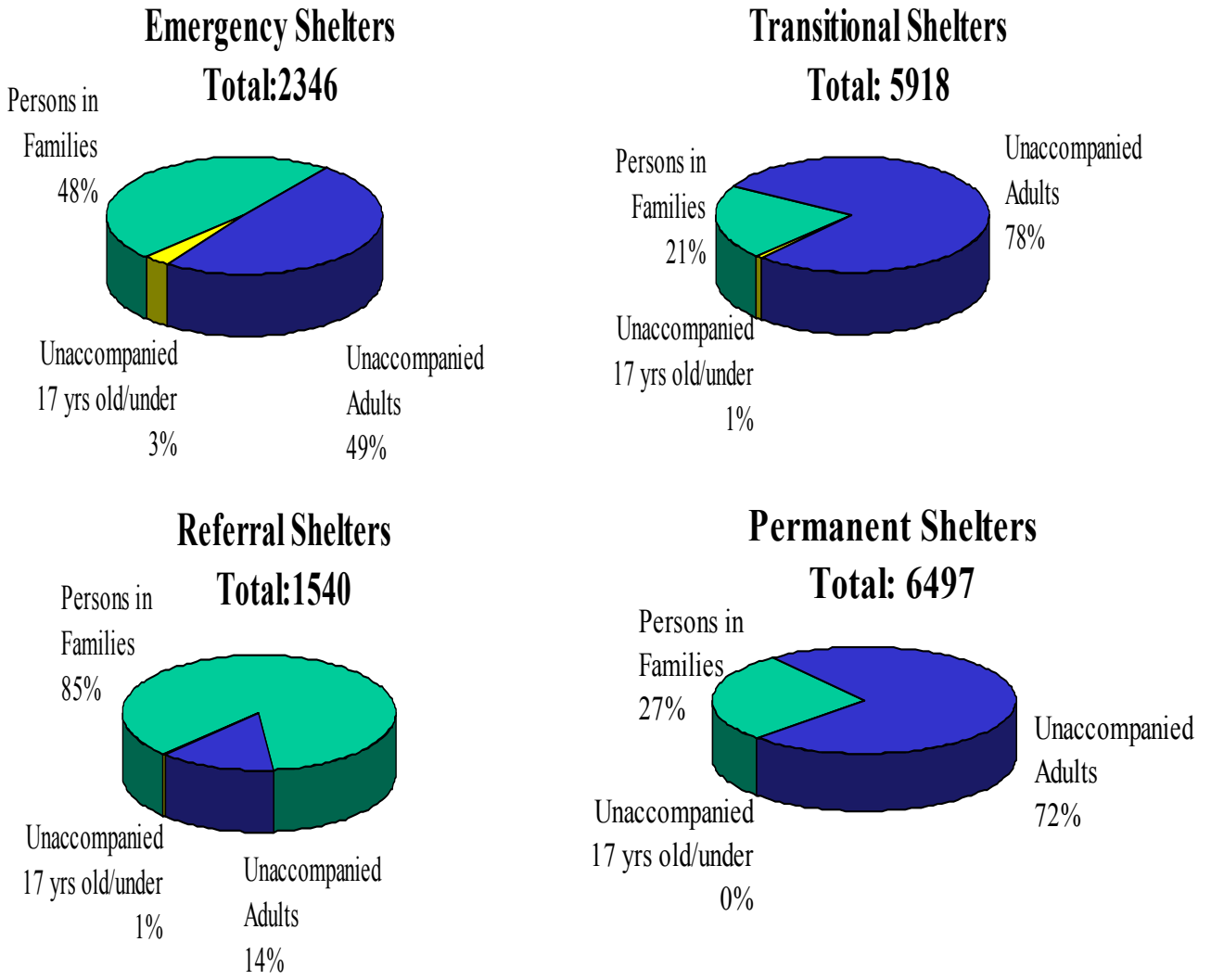

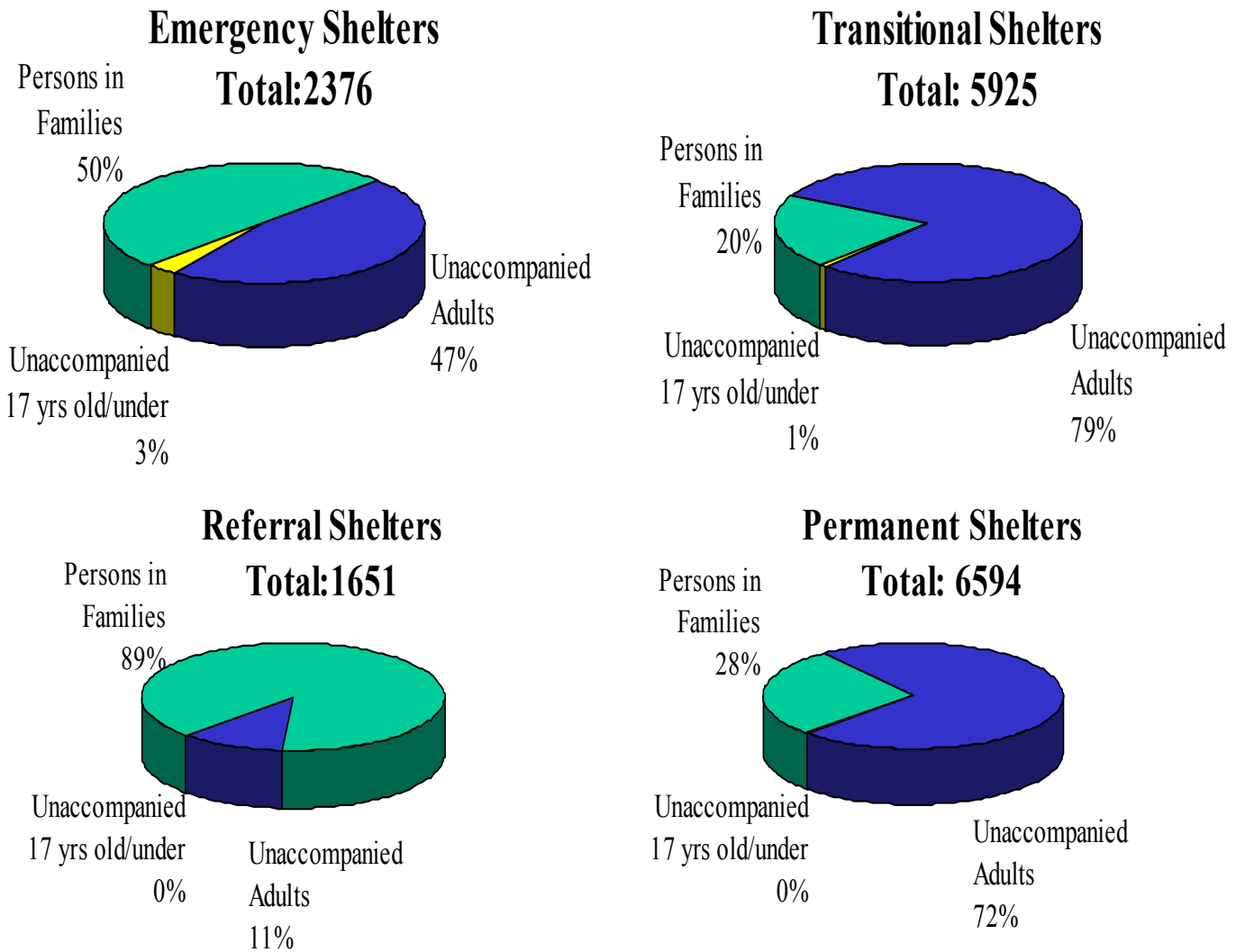

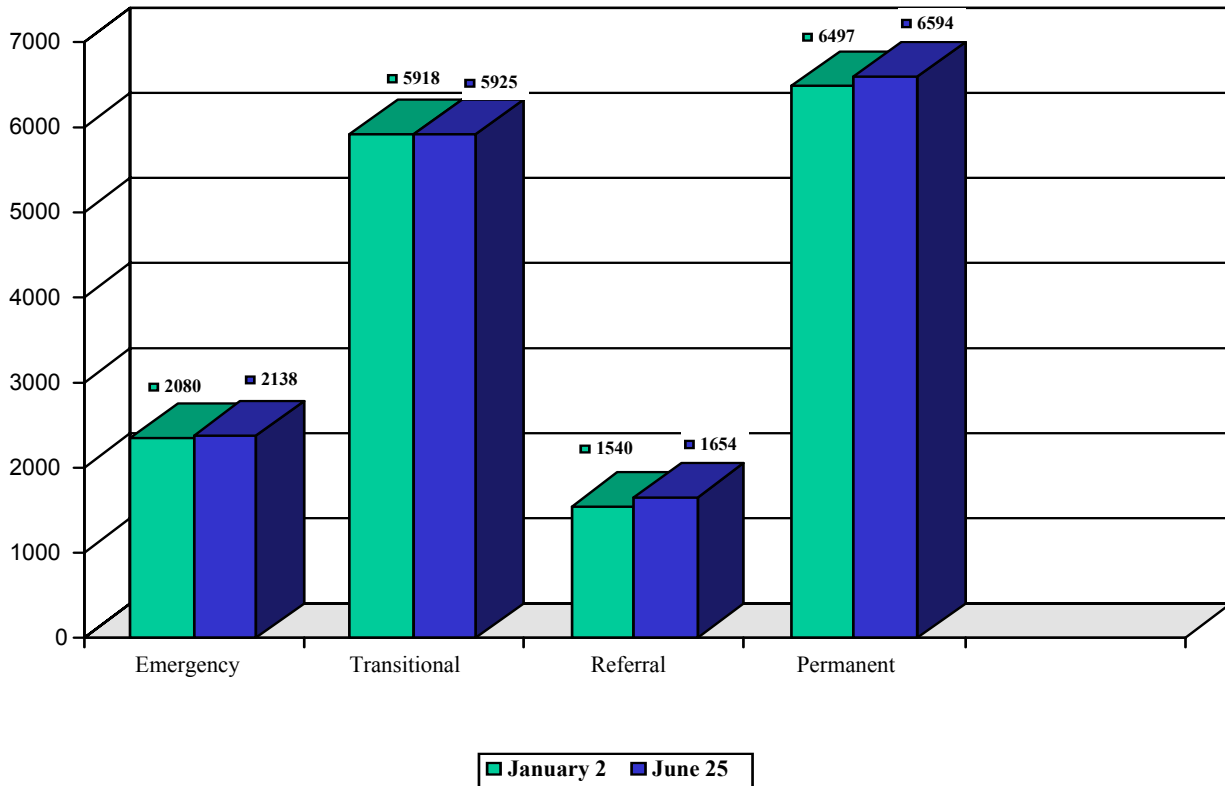

Emergency Shelter

Provides basic shelter(maybe food, clothing, necessities)

Transitional Shelter

Includes programming which addresses causes of homelessness(e.g. economic distress drugs, alcohol, domestic violence, mental illness, disability, pregnancy, etc.).

Shelter by Referral

Provides people shelter (such as hotels, motels, or private housing) by voucher (excluding Section 8 vouchers), voluntary contributions, pre arrangements, or federal or state emergency shelter monies, including those for prevention of imminent homelessness.

Permanent Shelter for homeless people with disabilities

Provides permanent shelter for people with disabilities who would otherwise be homeless.

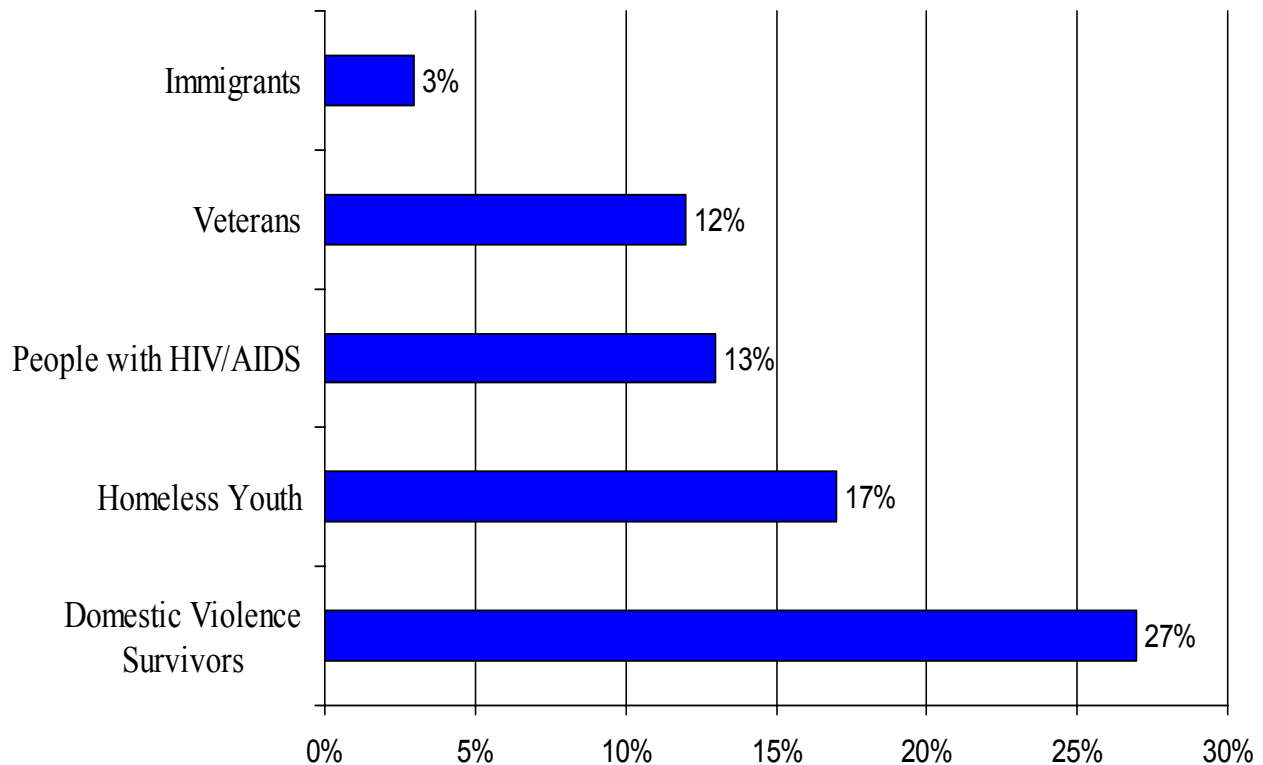

Census questions were answered by only some of those shelters responding (E.g., in 2001, 203 of the 465 shelters responding to the census answered some part of this question). Reporting on each sub-population differed slightly as to whether the data were from records or estimates (E.g., 146 of the 203 were from the estimates in 2001). Categories are non-mutually exclusive sub-populations. Percentages are weighted according to numbers of people sheltered. Since few shelters have intake procedures ascertaining status relative to these groupings, the imprecise nature of this information should be emphasized. Percentage Sheltered By Region - January 2, 2001**

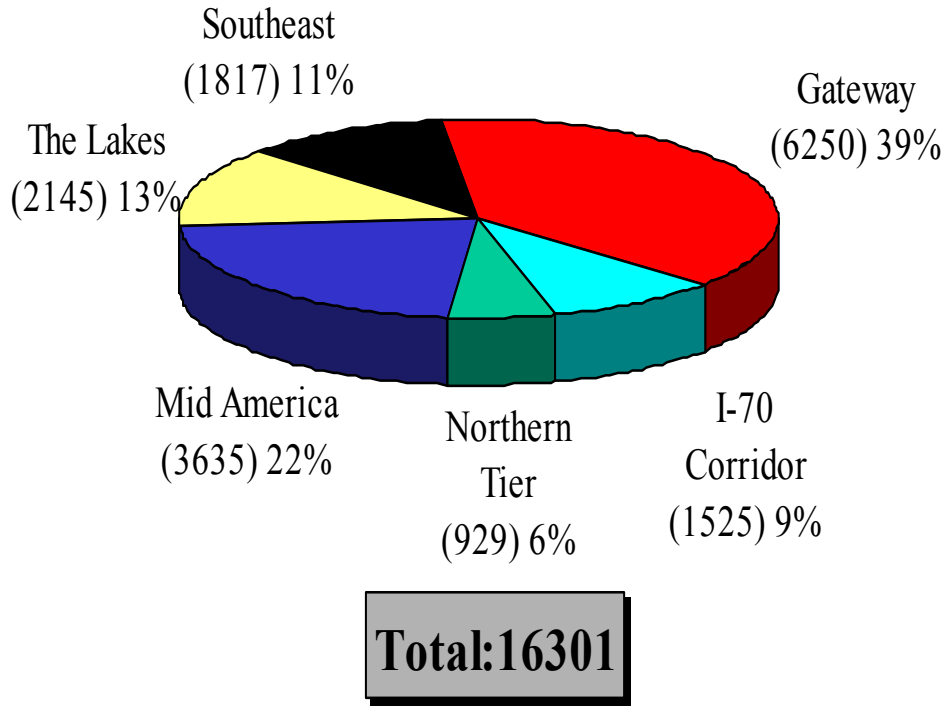

Population according to the 2000 U.S. Census / Poverty Rates according to 1990 U.S. Census:

- The Northern Tier Region contained 6% of Missouri's people,

Percentage Sheltered By Region - June 25, 2001**

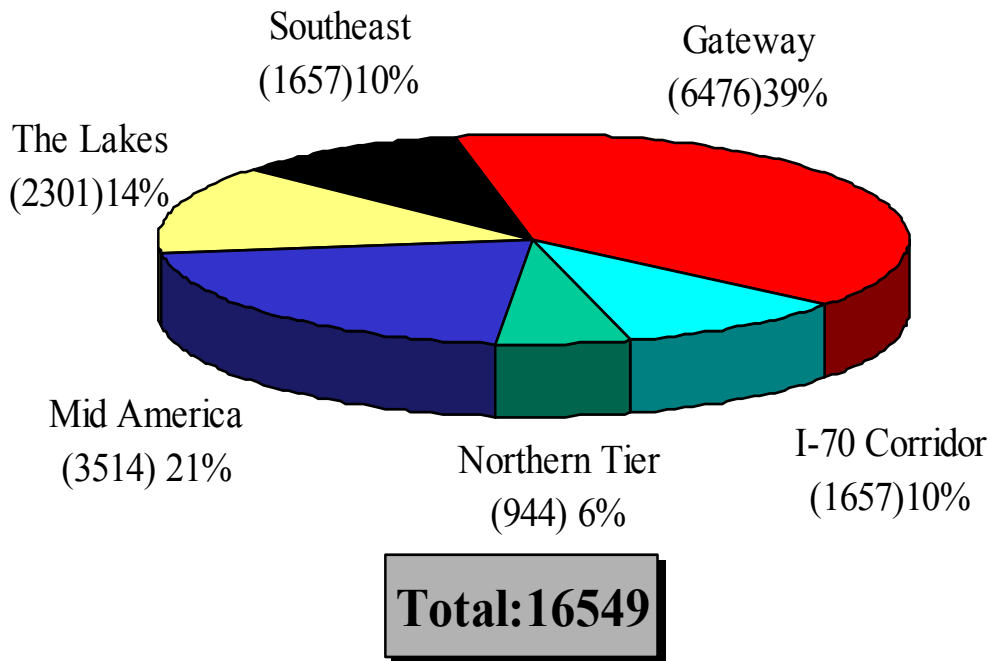

Missouri's Sheltered Homeless Persons With Severe Mental Illness and/or Drug-Alcohol Addictions - 2001

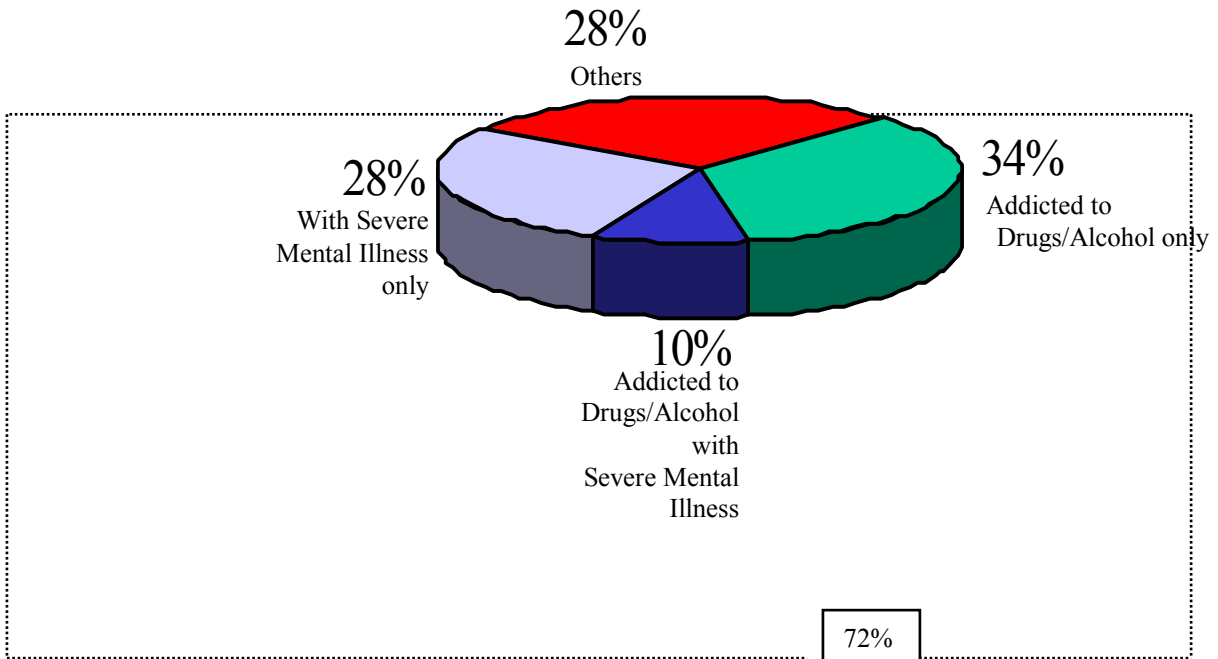

Survey questions for these subpopulations were answered by only some of those shelters responding (E.g., in 2001, 320 of 465 shelters responding answered these questions). Reporting on each sub-population differed slightly as to whether the data were from records or estimates (E.g., 166 of the 320 shelters responding were from estimates in 2001). Percentages were weighted by the number of people sheltered. It is important to note that shelters are generally not staffed to make clinical diagnoses. One problem often masks another. Homeless people fearful of not obtaining shelter will often censor their behavior. The total number of people with severe mental illness or drug-alcohol addictions sheltered *at a particular point-in-time* is probably close to accurate. Subgroupings within this category, however are subject to greater error. *Individuals with severe mental illness are those whose symptoms (e.g., hallucinations, paranoia, delusions, etc.) interfere with their ability to perform activities of daily living.*

Missouri's Sheltered Homeless Persons With Severe Mental Illness and / or Drug- Alcohol Addictions - 2001 By Shelter Type

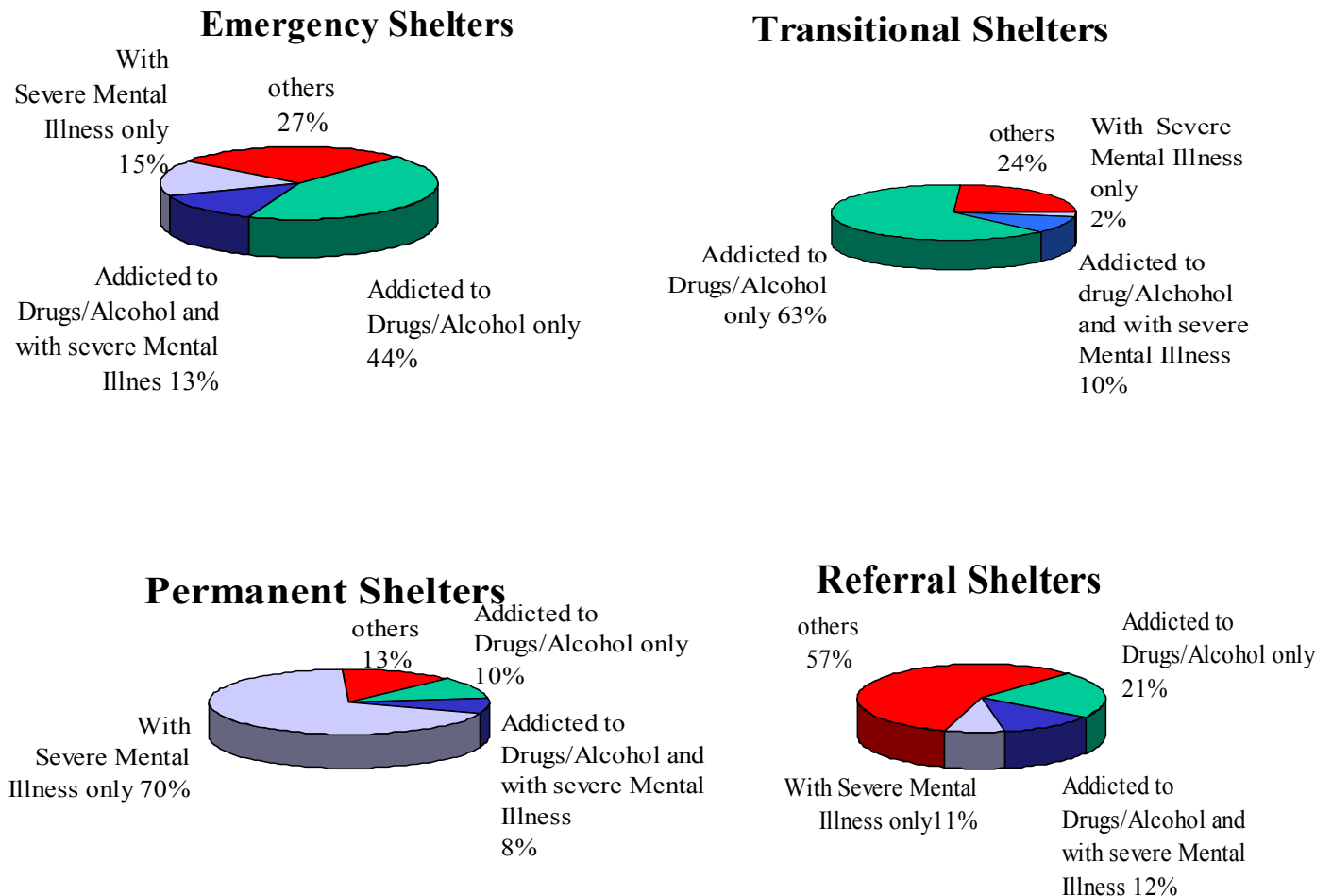

Reporting on each sub-population differed slightly as to whether the data were from records or estimates (e.g. 166 of the 320 numbers responding were from estimates in 2001). Percentages were weighted by the number of people sheltered. It is important to note that shelters are generally not staffed to make clinical diagnoses. One problem often masks another. Homeless people fearful of not obtaining shelter will often censor their behavior. The total number of people with severe mental illness or drug-alcohol addictions sheltered *at a particular point-in-time* is probably close to accurate. Subgroupings within this category, however, are subject to greater error. *Individuals with severe mental illness are those whose symptoms (e.g. hallucinations, paranoia, delusions, etc.) interfere with their ability to perform activities of daily living.*

Missouri's Sheltered Homeless Persons By Funding Source - 2001 By Shelter Type

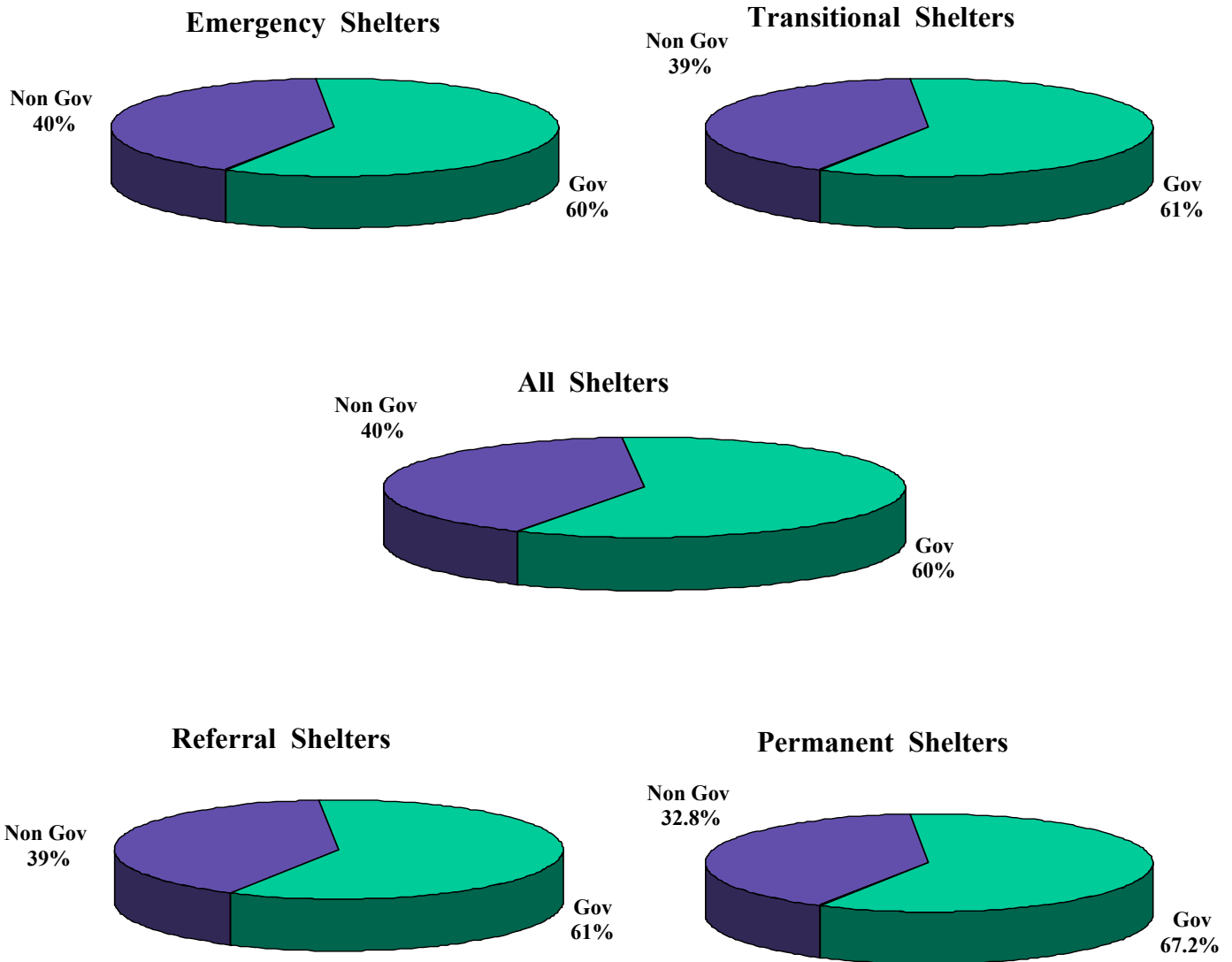

Large Metro/Small Metro/Non-Metro

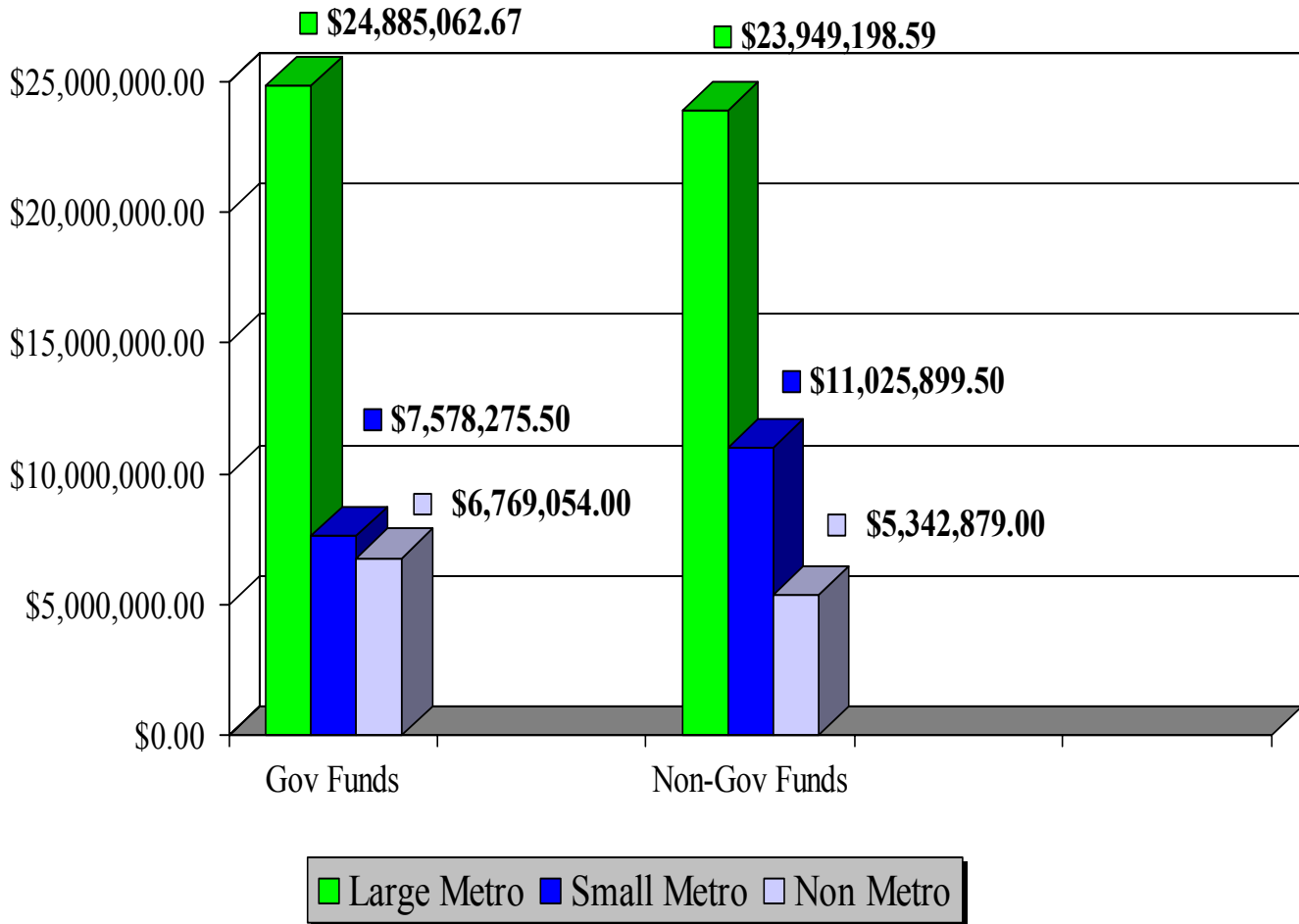

Missouri's Sheltered Homeless Persons Funding Sources By Region - 2001

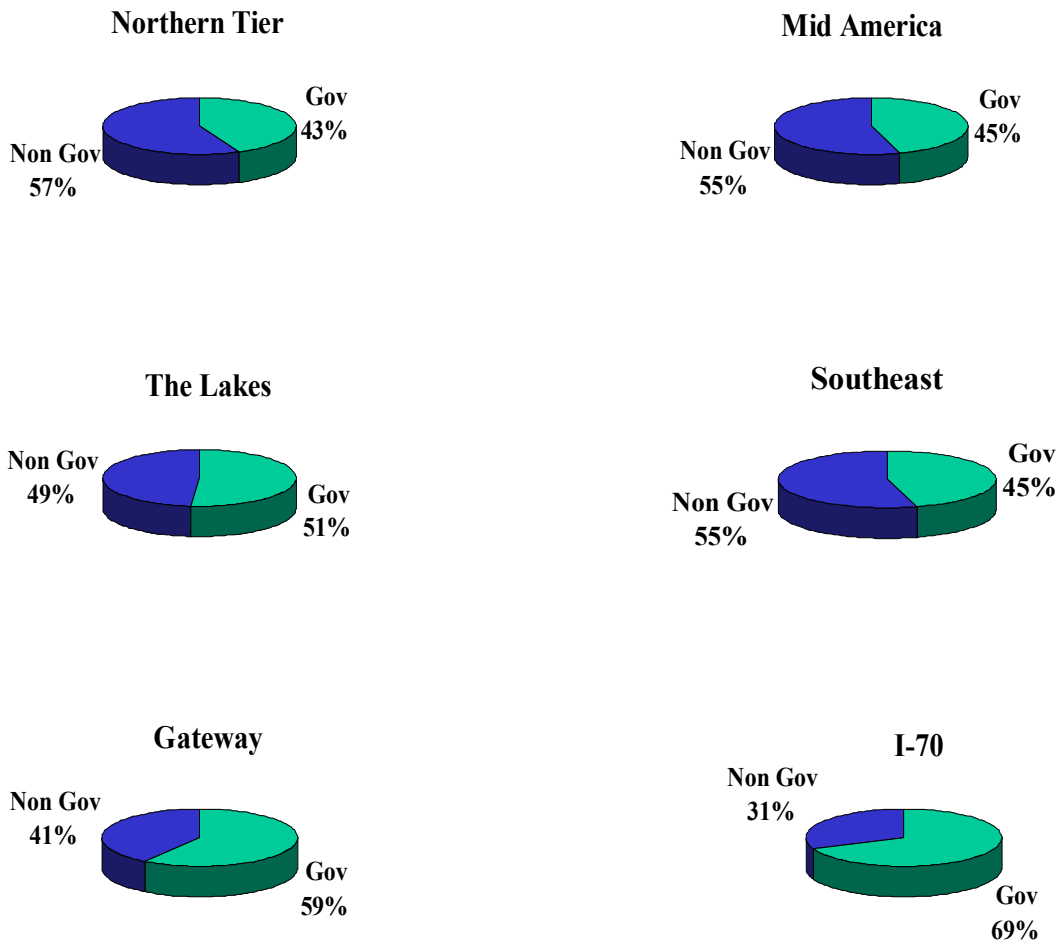

Total of Budgets Reported: \$57,791,439.26

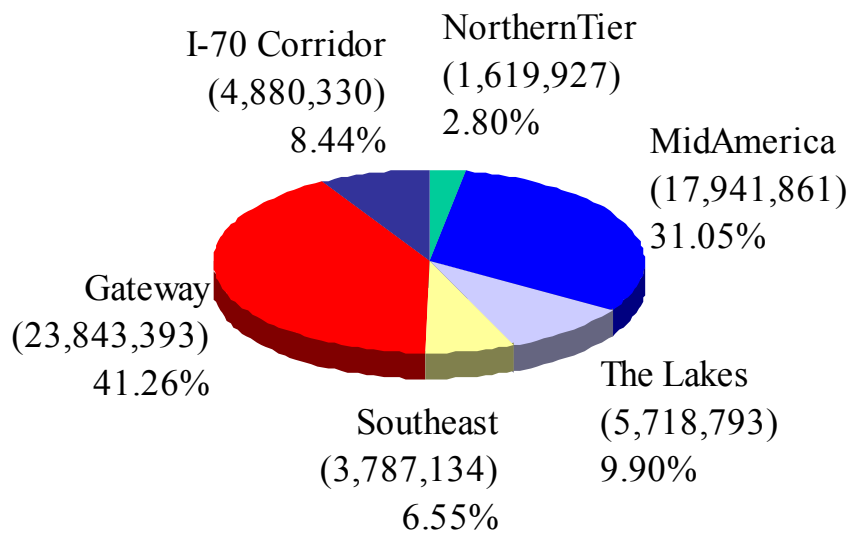

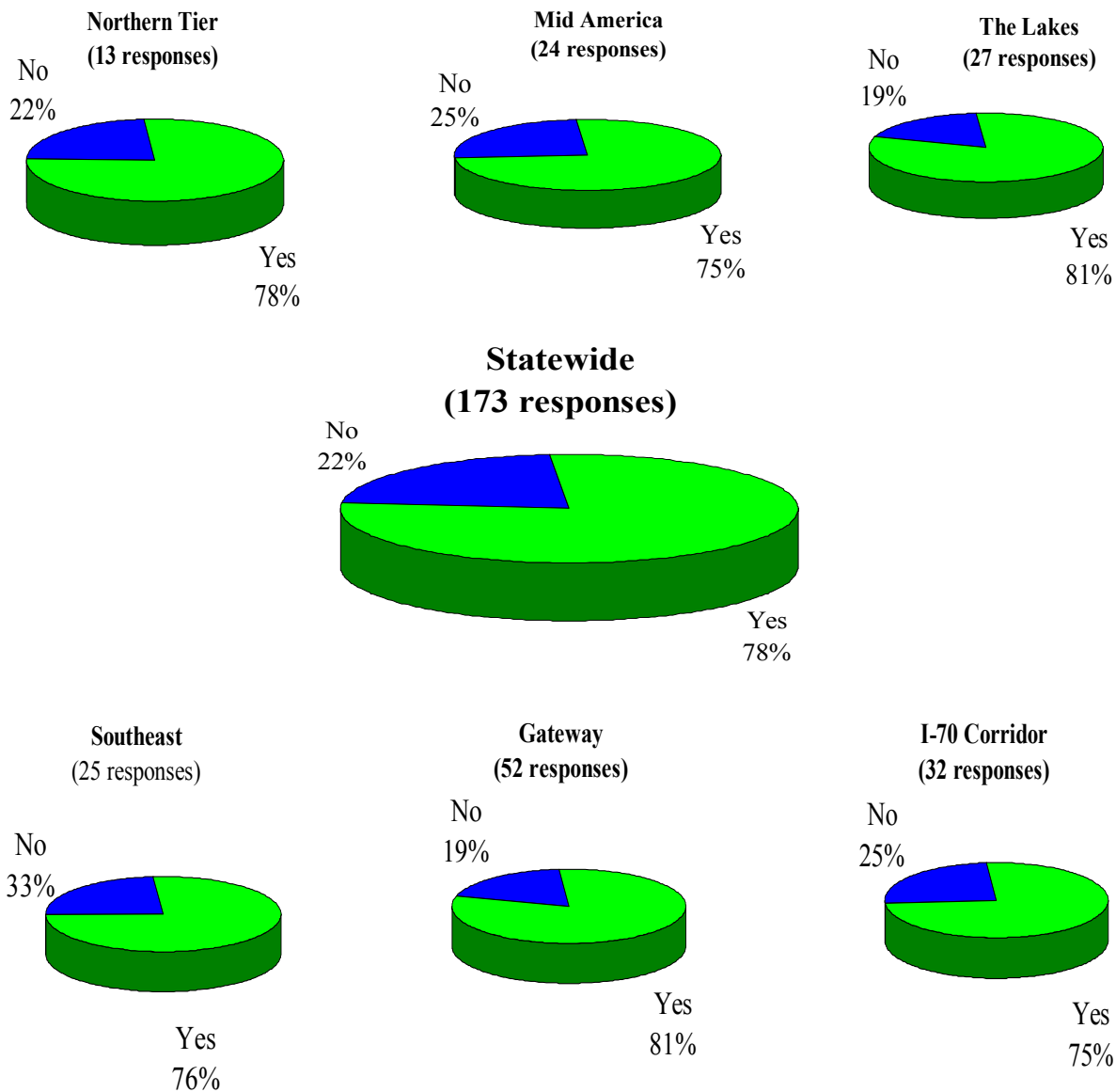

Most Affected the Homeless People for Whom They Provide Shelter**

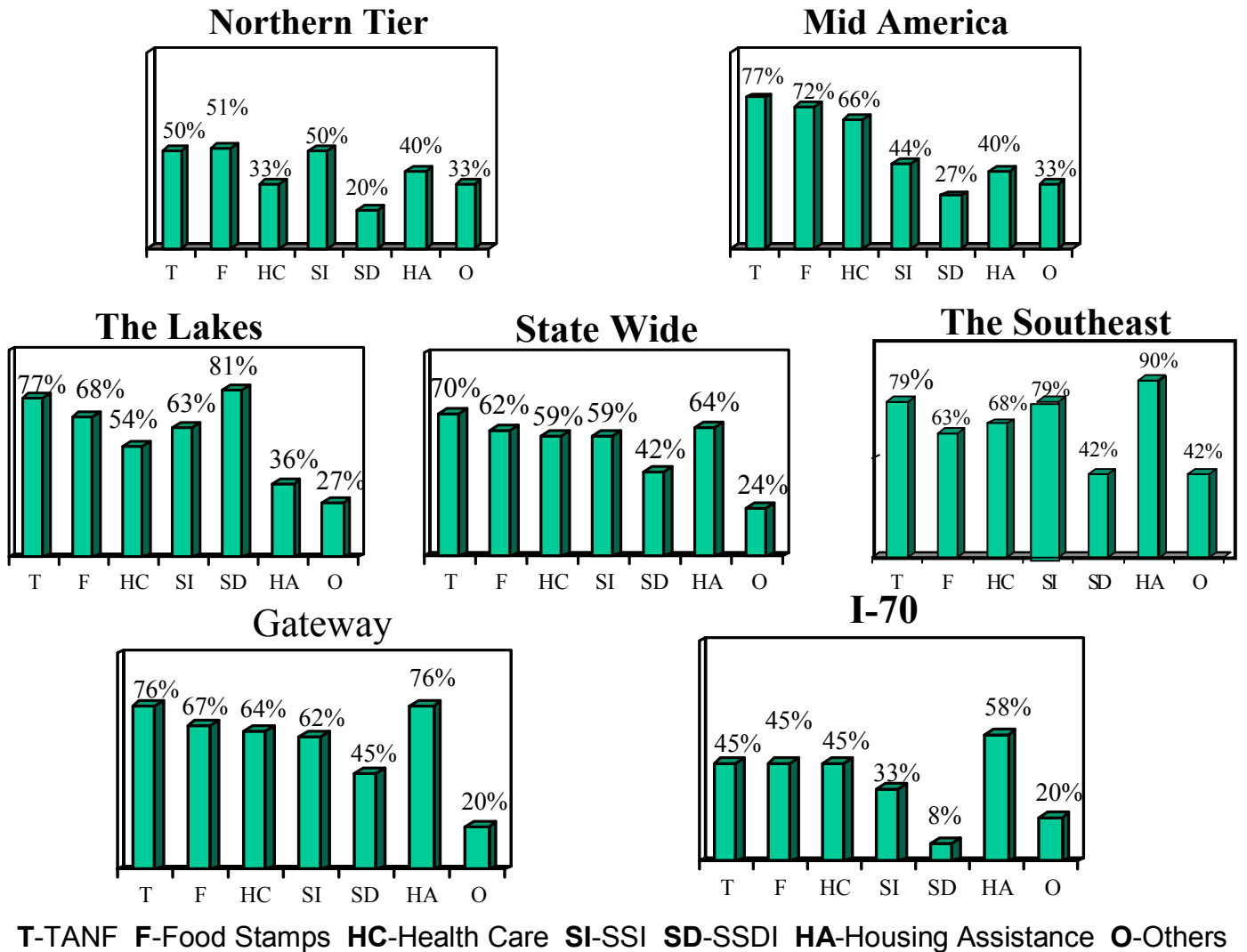
